Assessment

Are you where you want to be?

It is no surprise that assessment in home education is as varied as each of our homes. As our schooling ranges from formal to informal so do our assessments. Assessment

assumes a criteria. Do we know what the criteria is? Did we choose the criteria? Do our learners know what the criteria is? Is it a moving target? There are many questions we can ask ourselves but probably the most important is how does this criteria relate to the goals of our home education. There is value in being purposeful in determining our goals and objectives because then they can inform our curriculum (what we learn), our methodology (how we learn) and our assessments (when have we reached mastery). There are many types of assessment that occur throughout the learning process (diagnostic, formative and summative to name a few). There are also many different ways to assess knowledge or performance as varied as listening to your child read to taking the SAT. The type of assessment and the method of assessing are secondary to knowing where you want to be.

March 14, 2017 was a fun day! We had a tour of the Legislative Building and then got to sit in on the assembly. Each MLA was given an introductory letter containing a summary of our recent survey and a sweet treat prepared by Melanie Eigheneer. The building itself is very interesting if you enjoy old buildings and amazing carvings. If you have never been there and enjoy history, it is well worth your time. From a free standing (at least when it was built) spiral staircase to the original library (the only part that was not destroyed in the fire of 1880) to the huge pictures of King George V and his wife Queen Mary which were reportedly just "found" in an attic, it is amazing. The size of the rooms and the height of the ceilings indicate the grandeur that the builders and

designers of 1882 wanted this place to portray. The modern additions of the brass chandeliers has continued this feeling if not increased it. Aside from the impressiveness of this building, the staff and tour guide were friendly and professional. Several of the MLAs took time out of their busy day to come and speak with our group and to thank us for coming, but probably the best part was to have Premier Brian Gallant come and greet us and have his picture taken with our group while we were gathered on the famous spiral staircase. ~Lora Carter

Crandall's Science Department is accepting applications from students
who are a minimum of 16 years of age and who have had at least one year
of Grade 11 high school science.

It is intended for students who are thinking about going to university, but have not had senior high school level science laboratory experience. The program includes ten, 3 hour, high school level laboratory sessions in Biology and Chemistry.

The majority of students who typically attend are home schooled or attend private schools and the number accepted is limited.
